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Kingdoms of Cameroon

Cameroon encompasses Central and West Africa, deep primary forest and wild Atlantic coast, the people of forest tribes and farmers. The country also melds Francophone and Anglophone communities, vestiges of a colonial overlay. The country's economic growth and the desires and aspirations of a growing population can be both at odds with environmental protection and a major driving force behind it. There's much to interpret. Cameroon offers a total immersion in planet Earth.

Tour Itinerary Notes

While our intention is to adhere to the day-by-day itinerary as printed below, a degree of flexibility is built in. Overnight stops may vary from those suggested and on occasions alternative accommodation, of a similar standard to that named below, will be used.

Tour Guide

Our guides are a key strength, chosen for their knowledge of and passion for the areas in which they work. All of our guides are carefully hand-picked, and are not just passing through these countries, but are usually locally born. Unlike some companies it should be noted we do not send a guide or tour leader from Undiscovered Destinations in the UK as we have every confidence in our locally appointed representative who is responsible for operating the tour on our behalf. Where possible you will have the same guide throughout your trip but on occasions it may be necessary to change the guide at one or more points during the tour.

Itinerary

Day 1 – Douala

Arrive in Douala and transfer to hotel accommodation. The rest of the day is free to relax or explore this lively city. Overnight at Aquarius Hotel or similar.

Douala

Douala is Cameroon's largest city, although it is not the official capital – this honour falls to Yaoundé. A large, brash and vibrant city, Douala can be a rather blunt introduction to the country, but there is no better way to get to grips with modern Cameroon. Lacking in conventional sights, Douala makes up for it with excellent nightlife and restaurants, and a zest for life which can be intoxicating. The city was originally born out of the small settlements established by Portuguese traders who arrived in the 15th century, and went on from humble beginnings, to become an important port and the economic powerhouse of Cameroon. Although not the most attractive of African cities, in the right light the tropical ambience of Douala can be rather pleasant.

Day 2 – Douala- Mboroukou (180 kms, approx. 3 hours driving time)

Today's journey passes through rubber, banana, pawpaw, pineapple, cocoa and coffee plantations. And there's time to investigate newer and cash crops, increasingly contentious palm oil and even tropical flowers. Arriving at the village of Ekom, we enjoy a picnic lunch at the foot of the magnificent, 80m high 'Chutes d'Ekoum' waterfalls, used as a location for recent Tarzan movies. Our drive continues to the village of Mboroukou in the foothills of the Manengouba Mountains. Overnight at Villa Luciole Lodge or similar. (BD)

Day 3 – Mboroukou- Baham-Foumban (195 kms, approx. 3 hours driving time)

After breakfast we depart for Baham in the Hauts-Plateaux, and the palace of a traditional Bamileke chief. Later, we continue to Foumban, in relative Central African terms, a tourist hotspot. Sights include the Foumban Royal Palace, built in 1917 by King Ibrahim Njoya, and now a museum recording royal lineage from the 14th century. Elsewhere, though Foumban's economy is rooted in agriculture, it's also known for artisan





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wood workers and visual artists – there is time to visit both. Overnight at Paradise Hotel Koutaba or similar. (BD)

Foumban

Foumban is an important centre for African art and one of Cameroon's most culturally rich towns. The centrepiece of the town is the sultan's palace, which resembles a medieval chateau and is the seat of power for the Bamoun people. Foumban's museums hold excellent examples of Bamoun arts and crafts as well as exhibits on local history, masks, traditional dress and everyday items that have been used in Bamoun life. The Rue des Artisans is home to all manner of small shops and workshops and is one of the best places in Central Africa to buy wood carvings. Foumban is a predominantly Muslim town and one of the oldest in Cameroon

Day 4- Foumban- Batoufam (120 kms, approx. 2 hours driving time)

After breakfast, we visit a Bororo village and gain insights into rural life in Cameroon. Here, cattle husbandry is an important mainstay, milk being used by women to produce butter and yoghurt. Bororo women are also skilled in hair braiding, creating some striking styles. Later, we depart for Batoufam via Bafoussam, visiting Metchie waterfalls where Bamileke people make sacrifices in the hope their wishes will be granted. Overnight at the chief's palace in Batoufam. (BD)

Day 5 – Batoufam- Yaounde – Mbalmayo Forest Reserve (340 kms, approx. 5 hours driving time)

After a stop at the small town of Makenene to stretch our legs we arrive in Yaounde, Cameroon's capital, in time for a short city tour. Continuing through the Mbalmayo Forest Reserve, one of Cameroon's oldest protected areas, our destination is the eco-tourism village of Ebogo. Overnight at the "Centre d'Accueil" Lodge. (BD)

Yaounde

Cameroon's official capital city is smaller and more pleasant than its rival Douala, which remains the most important city of the country – although the pace of life here can still be hectic, it feels slightly more relaxed and its location on a series of leafy hills makes the climate here more conducive to exploring. Although it does not have too many specific attractions, there is an interesting museum of Cameroonian arts and crafts situated in a Benedictine monastery atop one of the hills, with some superb examples of masks from the many ethnic groups of the country.

Day 6 – Nyong River- Mefou Primate Sanctuary (90 kms, approx. 1 hour 30 mins driving time)

This morning we take a pirogue on the Nyong River and then join a guided walk through the rainforest to discover medicinal plant species. Later, we visit Mefou Primate Sanctuary which cares for rescued and orphaned chimpanzees and gorillas. We end the day by returning to Yaounde. Overnight at Merina Hotel or similar. (B)

Day 7 –Yaounde- Abongbang – Lomie (363 kms, approx. 6hrs 30mins driving time)

Today's journey to Lomie, via Ayos and Abongbang entails a long drive. However, the route cuts through thick equatorial rainforest via fascinating Baka and Bantu villages. Overnight at Raphia hotel or similar. (BD)

Days 8 & 9 – Dja Reserve (10 kms, approx. 15 mins driving time)

This morning we visit the village of Matisson, where a community tourism project educates visitors about the Baka people's unique and complex culture. During our stay we take walks in the forest, learn about hunting techniques, discover local folklore and much more. This is a superb opportunity to spend time with a fascinating people. Overnight in huts in the village. (BLD)

Please note: conditions in the village are very basic, with squat drop toilets and limited washing facilities. Please contact us for further information.



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Ba'Aka (Pygmy) People

The Ba'aka people are the original inhabitants of this region, having lived here for centuries before the great Bantu migrations, which saw them eventually reduced to minority status in their traditional lands. Typically, their villages are located in the forest, close to the flora and fauna that they hunt and gather by age old methods. The villages are usually constructed from materials found in the jungle, with houses being simple affairs made from branches, leaves and animal hides. They are expert hunters and organise group hunts for animals as large as forest elephants, although with the encroachment of logging and mining firms into their lands, wildlife is becoming less plentiful than in previous years. The term Pygmy is not used by the people themselves, who derive their names according to their particular ethnic group, such as Batwa or Ba'aka. In some areas Pygmy populations still live as virtual slaves to Bantu overlords. In recent years Pygmy groups have become more organised and have sent representatives to the UN and the World Bank in order to lobby and defend their rights, and be allowed to maintain their traditional lifestyles.

Day 10 – Yaounde (373km, approx. 6hrs 45mins driving time)

After bidding farewell to our Ba'Aka hosts we begin the drive back to Yaounde. Overnight at Merina Hotel or similar. (BD)

Day 11- Douala- Edea Park (280 kms, approx. 4 hours 30 mins driving time)

Today we head west towards the coast, via Edea, to the Douala-Edea National Park, home to the endangered Central Chimpanzees, one of West Africa's most threatened primates. A dedicated sanctuary within the park cares for orphaned chimpanzees, releasing them into the wild at Pongo Songo Island on the Sanaga River when they become adults. We take a boat ride to the island to observe the chimpanzees. Overnight at Hostellerie de la Sanaga. (B)

Day 12- Edea Reserve- Kribi (105 kms, approx. 1 hour 30 mins driving time)

On the Gulf of Guinea, Kribi is a beach resort and Cameroon's main port. Arriving in the afternoon, there's time for a boat ride on the Lobe River to visit Lobe Falls which possess the unusual attribute of discharging directly into the sea. Overnight at Tara Plage Hotel or similar. (BD)

Day 13 – Kribi - Douala (165km, approx. 2hrs 30mins driving time)

Kribi's palm-lined beaches provide a relaxing stroll before driving to Douala early afternoon. There's time to stretch our legs along the way during a stop at the fishing village of Londji. Overnight at Aquarius Hotel or similar. (B)

Day 14- Douala

Depending on your time of departure, there may be time to take a boat ride through the nearby mangrove forests and visit some local fishing villages. Tour ends with a transfer to the airport. (B)

Please note: *the driving times shown are approximate and can vary according to local conditions at the time of travel. They do not include the time allocated for stops along the way.*

We constantly monitor the advice posted by the British Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO). In particular we will always advise clients of any travel warnings. At present the FCO does not advise against travel to any of the places that we visit on our tour.

Please feel free to contact us should you have any specific concerns or if you would like to know in detail what measures are being taken to ensure visits remain trouble free and without incident.

Accommodation and Meals

Hotel Check-in Times

As a general rule most hotels will allow guests to check-in from 2pm. Please note that the price of your tour does not include guaranteed early check-in. Therefore, please advise us if you would like to ensure that your room is available for an earlier arrival. This is particularly relevant on the first day of the tour and for early morning arrivals. One option is to pre-book and pay for an extra night at the beginning of your tour which will guarantee your accommodation is available irrespective of what time you arrive. Please contact us for information and costs.

It should also be noted that on many of our tours we have set-aside Day 1 of the itinerary as an 'arrival day'. For this reason and because tour participants are likely to be arriving at different times, and often from different countries, guided sightseeing or other activities are not included. If you are arriving early or before the start date of the tour and would like to organise some extra arrangements on a private basis please contact us.

Accommodation Rating

Cameroon receives few tourists and while the hotels we use are generally categorised as 3 and 4 stars, in reality they do not meet the standards that properties of a similar rating in Europe would achieve. The facilities are in place with private bathrooms and a restaurant and/or bar as the norm, but the standards of



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maintenance are poor, and in many of them you may experience shortcomings as a result. There is often no similar alternative available or no alternative at all. The facilities at the Dja Reserve are extremely basic with squat drop toilets and very limited washing facilities.

We welcome solo travellers and single rooms will be allocated subject to the applicable tour supplement. Please note that on occasions you may not always be allocated a double or twin room, as some hotels have designated single rooms. These may be smaller in size. However, the supplement payable takes this into consideration.

Transport

The roads in Cameroon are often in poor condition, and as there are few tourists there is not a large pool of vehicles which can manage the different terrains covered by the tour. It is extremely difficult to find minibuses with AC and as these vehicles are used extensively, they may not be of pristine appearance.

Food & Drinks

The daily meal basis is shown in the tour itinerary; breakfast (B), lunch (L) and dinner (D). Please note that lunch may be a picnic. Drinks are not included and will be payable locally in cash.

Dietary Requirements

If you have any special dietary requirements you must notify us at the time of booking. While we will make every effort to cater for you, we cannot guarantee that this will be possible.

Budgeting for your Tour

You will need some extra money to cover meals and drinks not included in the tour price, any optional sightseeing, souvenirs and items of a personal nature such as laundry.

Food

The costs for meals will vary depending upon location, type of restaurant and number of courses eaten and so the prices given are an average guide. Local restaurants located off the beaten track may be less expensive, whereas an upmarket restaurant located in the centre of a major city may charge more.

Lunch and Dinner £4- £15

Drinks

The prices for drinks can vary greatly depending upon location and the prices detailed below are an average guide. In general, you would expect that drinks purchased in a supermarket or local bar to be less expensive, whilst drinks in an upmarket bar or restaurant will be more expensive.

Tipping – Guide and Drivers

Tipping is commonly recognised as a way of rewarding guides and drivers for good service. If you are happy with your guide and driver, please consider leaving a tip for them. If you are travelling on a group tour, a reasonable amount would be around £5 per day for the guide and £3 per day for the driver, between the group – this works out at around £110 for a 14-day tour, split between however many group members there are. If you are travelling on a private basis, then around £4 per day for the guide and £2 per day for the driver is reasonable.

Tipping is generally only expected in the higher end restaurants, rather than the smaller establishments, but a few coins are appreciated.

Joining your Tour

Flight Information

You are able to book this tour on a 'land only' basis or as a 'flight inclusive' package. Your flight inclusive package will be fully protected by the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) ATOL protection scheme.

Joining Your Tour Abroad

Customers booked on the 'Land Only' arrangements will receive an airport transfer, both on arrival and departure include in the tour price. In order that the transfer can be arranged please ensure that you advise us of your flight information once available. Please advise the date, time and flight number for your arrival/departure. If we have not been advised of this information at least 2 weeks before travel, then you will be required to make your own way to the hotel on Day 1 of your tour.

Travel Insurance

It is a condition of booking with Undiscovered Destinations that you have adequate valid travel insurance. It is your responsibility to arrange appropriate travel insurance and ensure you have read and understood the full terms and conditions of your travel insurance policy to ensure that you are covered for all activities you intend to undertake whilst on the tour, including all optional activities. Your Insurance Policy must fully cover you for medical expenses and emergency repatriation to your home country and be valid for the entire duration of your holiday.

Visa Information

Visitors from most countries, including UK, EU and US visitors require a visa for entering Cameroon. You will need a Letter of Invitation to obtain your visa – in order that we may make arrangements for this, you will need to send us a scanned copy of your passport at the time of booking.

Visa regulations can frequently change and this is particularly the case with Cameroon. Therefore, we recommend that you check with your nearest embassy for the most up to date details. At the moment the Cameroon Embassy in London require a Polio Certificate to be submitted as part of the visa application.

Passports

It is your responsibility to ensure that you are in possession of a full passport, valid for at least six months after the date of return to the UK.

We strongly advise that your passport contains a minimum of two blank pages, as this may be a requirement of the local immigration authorities. In addition, certain countries will stipulate that the two blank pages are opposite each other. If you are unable to meet these requirements you may be refused boarding by your airline or denied entry by the immigration authorities.

For specific information about the requirements for your destination please check with the country's embassy or consulate. Alternatively, UK citizens can visit www.gov.uk/foreign-travel-advice





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Vaccinations & Protection

As with travel to most parts of Africa, we strongly recommend that you contact your doctor's surgery or a specialist travel clinic for up-to-date information, advice and the necessary vaccinations. For a visit of less than one month, almost certainly you will be advised to have immunisations against the following: Diphtheria and Tetanus, Hepatitis A, Typhoid, Meningitis.

Yellow Fever vaccination is required for all travellers arriving into Cameroon. You will be asked to produce a Yellow Fever Vaccination Certificate on arrival in the country. Failure to do so could lead to a further vaccination being administered at the port of entry, for which a charge is made, or you could be refused entry.

The legal status and regulation of some medicines prescribed or purchased in your home country can be different in other countries. If you're travelling with prescription or over-the-counter medicine, read this guidance from NaTHNaC on [best practice when travelling with medicines](#). For further information on the legal status of a specific medicine, you'll need to contact the embassy, high commission or consulate of the country or territory you're travelling to.

Preparing for your tour

Climate

Generally speaking, the best time to visit Cameroon is between November and March, when the temperature will be hot, but not uncomfortably so. Cameroon's rainy season is from May to November and travel can be difficult during this time.

Clothing

Cameroon is generally warm and so light clothes are a good idea. You should ensure that you bring warmer clothes for evenings in the north. Please remember that Cameroon has a large Moslem population and conservative attitudes towards dress, and so women should bear this in mind and ensure that clothing is appropriate, especially at any religious sites. You should also bring a hat to protect yourself from the strong sun.

Equipment

The first thing on your list should be a first aid kit. Whilst there is no undue cause for alarm, travellers are best advised to travel well-prepared: adequately immunized, with sufficient supplies of prescription drugs, along with a medical kit. Suncream/sunblock is a must. Insect repellent, including a bite spray will also be useful to have. A torch (flashlight) is advisable for your stay in the the Dja Reserve. You will need to bring a sleeping bag for our tours in Cameroon but an inflatable mattress is provided where necessary.

Footwear

Footwear is a main priority on this tour. Comfortable, sturdy walking shoes/boots are recommended, as well as a pair of sandals for travelling between places and in your accommodation.

Service Standards

Please note that standards of service in much of Africa are not comparable to those of more developed countries, especially in the more off the beaten track locations. Service is often slow and lacks the same attention to detail, and your patience and understanding will be appreciated.



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Luggage on tour

Your luggage should not exceed 20kgs (44lbs). One large suitcase/rucksack, and one small hand luggage rucksack is acceptable.

Wi Fi

While Wi Fi is available it is patchy and you may go several days without being able to access it.

Electric Supply & Plugs

Electrical supply is 220V/50 Hz and plugs have two round pins like most European countries.

Tour Itinerary Versions

Please ensure that you have an up-to-date copy of these tour notes immediately before you travel, as from time to time our itineraries may be amended, either for operational reasons or in response to feedback from customers.
